'Death, Taxes and Development: why aid is not the answer but taxes might be.'

The developing countries of the global south need an exit strategy from aid, if they are ever to 'stand on their own feet' in the long term. Certain aspects of the international tax system play a role in perpetuating global poverty, but paying taxes could be the key to ending poverty – for good.

Dr Tim Wallis was present at the Hague Appeal for Peace in 1999 when Nonviolent Peaceforce (NP) was first conceived, and is now its Executive Director. NP undertakes unarmed civilian peacekeeping roles that would formerly have been done by the military. NP is currently invigilating a truce in Indonesia and recently received \$1 million from the UN to do work in Southern Sudan. He led an exploratory peace team to Chechnya and has been involved in setting up a number of other peace team projects. He holds a PhD in Peace Studies from Bradford University.

Chris Cole has been researching and campaigning on the issue of armed drones since 2008. He is a former Director of the Fellowship of Reconciliation and co-ordinator of Campaign Against Arms Trade (CAAT). He is co-author of *'Convenient Killing: Armed Drones and the Playstation Mentality'*, and is the secretary of the Drones Campaign Network. He speaks regularly on drones and the growth of remote warfare and maintains the Drone Wars UK blog.

The Very Revd Dr Alan McDonald is the guest preacher at the inter-denominational Service for Justice and Peace, to be held in Hexham Abbey. A former Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Alan McDonald has taken part in many acts of worship at the Trident nuclear submarine base at Faslane, witnessing to a shared faith in Jesus Christ the Prince of Peace, and underlining a belief that nuclear weapons are morally and theologically wrong.

Greg Muttitt is Campaigns & Policy Director at War on Want. His book *'Fuel on the Fire - Oil and Politics in Occupied Iraq'* draws on hundreds of previously unreleased US and UK documents, as well as dozens of interviews with government officials, oil company executives and Iraqi civil society. In his previous job with the campaigning charity 'Platform', Greg worked both in Iraq and internationally to publicise the secret plans for Iraq's oil. He has visited there three times.

Cathy McCormack lives in Easterhouse, Glasgow. A long term campaigner on housing, health, poverty and the environment, she has worked for the last 25 years with Community Critical Psychologist Professor David Fryer. Widely known as a popular social commentator, her writings and broadcasts have received international acclaim. Her biography, *'The Wee Yellow Butterfly'* was published in 2009.

John Christensen is co-founder of the Tax Justice Network and directs its London-based International Secretariat. An experienced auditor and economist, for 11 years he was economic adviser to the government of Jersey. As well as working in a variety of the world's poorer countries, he has also advised a range of NGOs, and published and broadcast widely. John lives with his wife and two sons in the Chiltern Hills between London and Oxford.

Prof Paul Rogers studies trends in international conflict, developing an analysis of the linkage between socio-economic divisions, environmental constraints and international security. Since 9/11, his focus has been on western military responses to political violence and the problems arising from the 'war on terror'. A regular commentator on global security issues in both the national and international media, he is also openDemocracy's International Security Editor.

Dr Frank Boulton is the current Chair of the Board of Medact. He was Consultant Haematologist and Senior Lecturer at the London Hospital, Royal Liverpool Hospital, and Edinburgh Royal Infirmary. He has served as Medical Director of Wessex Regional Blood Transfusion Centre, and as Honorary Civilian Consultant Advisor to HM Armed Forces in Blood Transfusion. Until 2011 he was a Board Member of the Oxford Research Group.

Paul Brannen is Head of Advocacy and Influence at Christian Aid, with responsibility for policy, campaigns and media work. Currently his focus is on the growing problem of climate change in the developing world, and also the scandal of tax avoidance by some unscrupulous multinational companies, which robs poor countries of much-needed funds. Paul spent 5 years on Newcastle City Council and has twice stood for the Westminster Parliament, including Hexham in 2001.
